Here's our top tips to make your fundraising a hole-in-one!

Save some cash

Make the most of your fundraising by asking the golf club to waive the fee for booking the green.

Club together

Ask players to donate to take part – or set each player a fundraising target! You could also set up a penalty system where players have to donate a set amount for every bogey, shot over par or when the ball lands in a bunker or the water.

Buy a mulligan

Got some nervous golfers? Offer the chance for players to buy mulligans in advance – so they can retake any shots they're not happy with, without getting a penalty!

Sponsor a hole

Ask local businesses to sponsor a hole on the course. You might include their logo in your email invitations, add to posters or on the hole flags.

Get spectators involved

Invite players' friends and families and get them involved by hosting other fundraising activities in the clubhouse like a bake sale, bingo or quiz. You could even host a 'guess the number of tees in a jar' competition, or a game of pin the tee on the 18th hole - perfect for all age groups!

Ask for donations to take part and download our cake flags, template bingo cards, quiz sheets and sweepstake poster to add some extra fun to the day.

Donate using your Wallet app

You can now easily collect donations through the Wallet app on your smartphone.

Visit your JustGiving fundraising page on your device and scroll down to the share options. You'll see the 'Add to Wallet' button, which will generate a unique QR code.

Once added to your wallet, open your JustGiving wallet pass and anyone who wishes to donate can scan the QR code using their camera or scanner app.

This will take them to your fundraising page where they can choose to donate.

Get competitive

Gather your players and spectators on the green to take part in some easy golf challenges. Hold a closest-to-the-pin or a longest drive contest to bring out their competitive nature!
