4 colour-coded sections...

Tips for using the cards:



Use these cards to help a person plan for what happens after they die – specifically a person's funeral or memorial and how they want to be remembered.



Some ideas for questions:

- What do you think about ... e.g. having flowers at your funeral?
- Do you want ... e.g. music at your funeral?
- If yes, what sort of ... e.g. music?



There are blank cards so that you can add any other topics.



Each card has space to write or draw thoughts on.



You can use all the cards, or the person can choose the ones they want to talk about.

Let people know that they can choose not to talk about any topic. You could have a box, bin or envelope they could put a card in, so that they are in control of this



If someone gets upset, don't rush them, but listen and give them time to explore these feelings.



If someone is unable to tell you what they think, you can ask the people who know them well (e.g. family, carers): 'What do you think the person would say, if they could tell us?'

Record and **share**

With the person's consent, record and share their wishes with relevant people (e.g. family, health and social care staff). This means they can be acted on. You can record their wishes using the space on the cards or the recording sheet.
